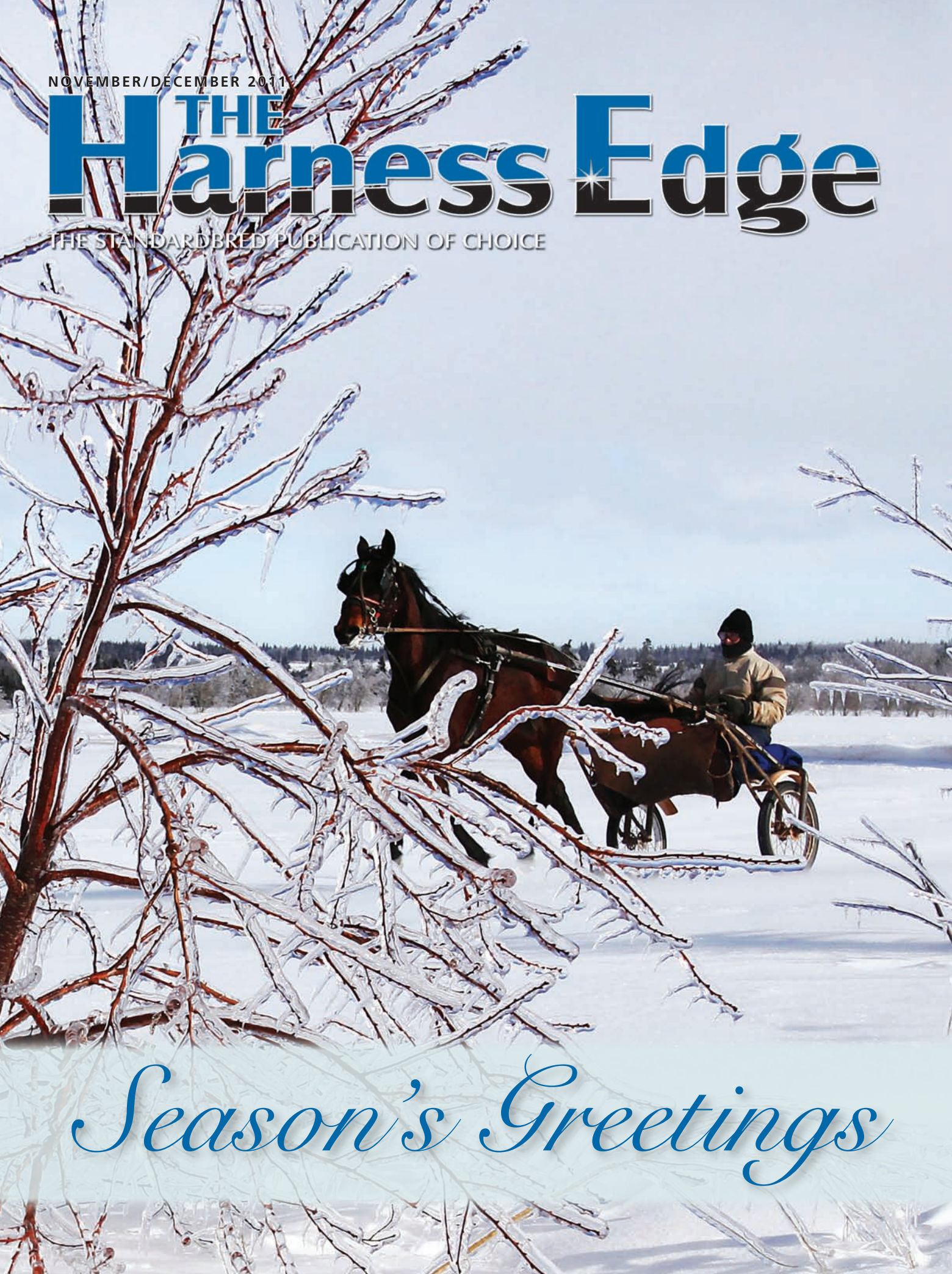

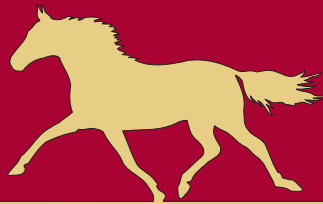
Canada's Next Great Trotting Sire

There is every reason to believe that the best Canadian bred two-year-old trotting colt of all time is going to be Canada's next great trotting sire.

The crucial racing year for measuring the future potential of any stallion is his two-year-old year. Windsong Espoir was devastating at two, winning nine straight stakes by a total of 45 lengths, including the \$517,689 Wellwood by 6 1/4 lengths. That's the kind of racing performance that virtually ensures a great career in the stud.

This is the third year for Windsong Espoir, and it is the time when smart breeders will cash in on the success his first two crops are promised. It's worth noting that his sire, Kadabra, now stands for a fee of \$15,000. That provides a perspective on the value his best son offers at \$3,500.

Windsong Espoir stands at Westwind Farm, Strathroy, Ontario, under the management of Walnut Hall Ltd., and for the record, Walnut Hall is breeding eight of our top mares to him in 2012.

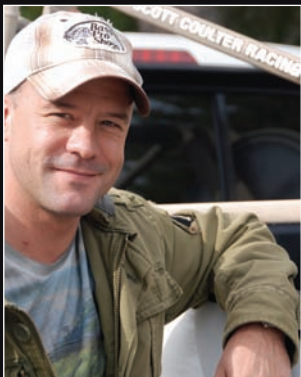

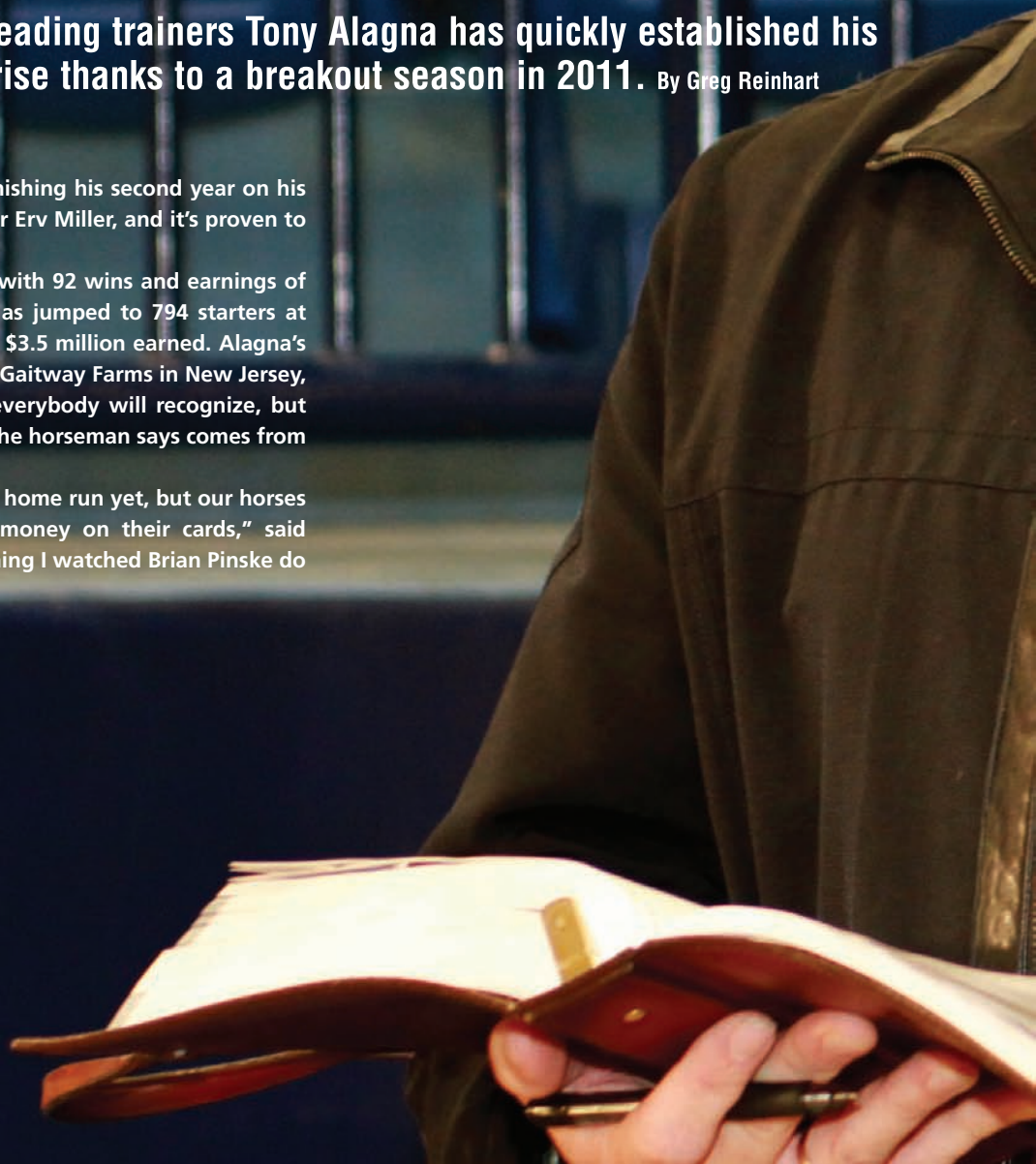
Waiting For The Home Run Horse

After working for several leading trainers Tony Alagna has quickly established his own stable as one on the rise thanks to a breakout season in 2011. By Greg Reinhart

Trainer Tony Alagna is close to finishing his second year on his own after serving as second trainer for Erv Miller, and it's proven to be the best of his career.

In 2010, he sent out 502 starters with 92 wins and earnings of over \$1.3 million, but in 2011, that has jumped to 794 starters at press time, for 124 victories, and over \$3.5 million earned. Alagna's main operation, which has 60 head at Gaitway Farms in New Jersey, doesn't have a standout horse that everybody will recognize, but has several solid campaigners, a trait the horseman says comes from one of his other previous employers.

"Of course we haven't hit our big home run yet, but our horses make it to the races and they get money on their cards," said Alagna. "That's a testament to something I watched Brian Pinsky do for years."

"He was very much a value shopper when he bought yearlings and he was the king of being able to put \$100,000 or \$200,000 on a horse's card, and people wouldn't even know who the horse was.

"I think that the home run is going to come. As they say, he's one horse away. I like the fact that a horse like Foreign Officer has made \$290,000 this

like that.”

Alagna's story is similar to many in the harness racing industry. His parents, including mother Donna Lee Ozment who still trains horses in the Chicago area including 15 for Alagna, and father Peter Alagna, were active in the business before he was born. Tony spent his formative years working around his parents' horses before moving on to work for other people.

“Every day after school I'd go to the barn,” Alagna recalled. “The school I went to when I was a child was about five minutes from the county fairgrounds in Champaign, Illinois, and I would walk from school to the barn, and help my parents.

“On weekends and summer vacations, I was always around the horses and involved with them and the barn. I just kind of started from there. I got my foothold with them. Then when I turned 20 I went to work for Brian Pinske. I left Illinois, went down to Florida the first year for him and spent six years as his second trainer.”

After working for Pinske for that period, Alagna went back to Illinois. However, he was never far away from harness racing and stepped out on his own for the first time as a private trainer for the Illinois-based Fox Valley Standardbreds.

“I decided to go back to school and try to finish up my associate's and get my bachelor's degree, so I took some time off from working for Brian,” Alagna offered.

“I actually went to Illinois to work for Fox Valley Standardbreds during my summer break from college down in

Florida, and while I was in Illinois working for them as a second trainer for their son-in-law, they asked me to stay on because their son-in-law had gone into another business.

“They needed a trainer and they said if I wanted to stay on, they were interested in having me train their stable. I stayed there for four years.

“After those four years, they decided to downsize. It had been their own private training stable and had basically been developed to promote their breed a little bit and what they were selling at the yearling sales. If they weren't happy with what a horse brought, they would train it. It helped keep their product up.

“They had Sportsmaster and Armbro Charger, they had horses that were headliners that were doing well and selling well so there wasn't really as much need for the training stable as there had been previously. They wanted to downsize, and that's when I met with Erv Miller and he asked me if I wanted to go Florida and train for him.”

That relationship with Miller was a productive one as the barn saw several stars such as Loyal Opposition, Restive Hanover, Classic Photo, and Shark Gesture pass through their operation. However, there was one horse from that time that Alagna looks back on most fondly.

“Lis Mara was always special to me just because I was involved with him more than a lot of the others,” Alagna said about the son of Cambest the Miller Stable acquired as a four-year-old and Alagna looked after that year and as a five-year-

old.

"He was a tremendous horse. In my opinion, you talk about an all around horse, he could leave, he could race off the pace, he could come first-up, he could do everything.

"The thing that I'll always remember about that horse is his gentleness. He was such a gentleman in the barn. You could jog him with two fingers. He was a pleasure to be around.

"They talk about great horses making it fun to come to the barn in the morning; he was that horse. I looked forward to going into the barn in the morning and jogging that horse. He was just that horse for me."

Alagna's time with Erv Miller also readied him for when he went back out on his own.

"We had a great working relationship. I went to Florida in the winter time with a string down there. Marcus and Hannah, his two children were still in school, so he would stay in Springfield, Illinois, and come down a couple times a month and check on things, stay for four or five days, and then he had a string of horses back in Illinois as well.

"During the summers, I would either go to Canada or New Jersey, and New Jersey is where I ultimately ended up with Erv and where I opened my operation when I went out on my own two years ago.

"The good thing about it is working for Erv was a great stepping stone. Erv put a lot of faith in me and confidence in me as far as when I was running a satellite stable somewhere else, he was the final call on everything. When there was a

horse that was sick or sore or needed something, he made the final decision, but I brought all those decisions to him.

"I ran the barn as if it was my own with him making the final call, so it worked pretty well that way. When you're able to do that, you're preparing yourself for what you're going to do on your own.

"I had talked to a few of my friends and associates in the business, people who trained horses also, I said, 'I'm going to be 37 years-old; I'm not getting any younger, and I think the time is now.' I felt like I had paid my dues.

"I had showed everybody my responsibility and my dedication to training horses, and I just felt like it was the right time to do it. I always knew it would feel right, and it did. The timing was right, so it was a smooth transition."

The next step after going out on his own was getting some horses to go with it, and Alagna's familiarity with people in the business from having worked in it so many years and his willingness to get involved with owning shares of horses himself, paid off at the yearling sales that fall.

"When I went out on my own, I'd known so many people in the industry through working for Brian and working for Erv and just from being the business," stated Alagna. "I say our business gets smaller all the time.

"There's not many people who pop into the industry that you don't know or you don't know who they are associated with. When I went out on my own, I had two horses I owned part of and those were the only horses that I had spoken for.

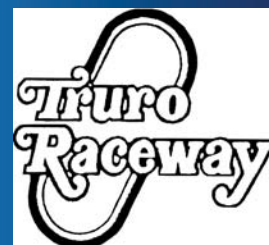

bought this year and the two-year-olds that I'm holding over. Right now I own pieces of 30 horses in my barn.

"I just think that with the way the market is right now on horses, a trainer should stick out his neck out a little bit and take a vested interest in what he's doing. If you don't have enough faith in yourself to put the money out there, then how can you expect others to do the same?"

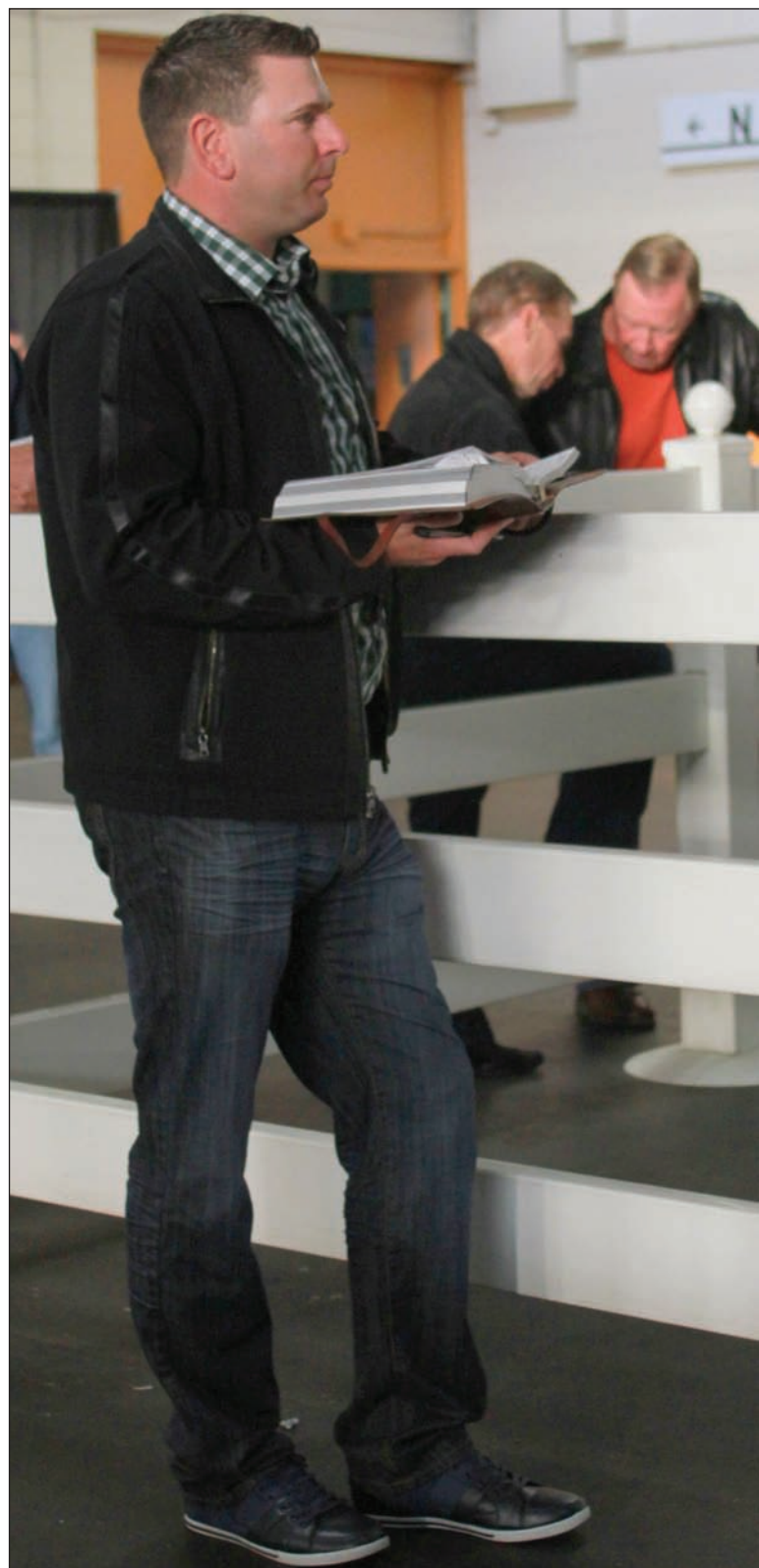
Alagna's stable picked up its biggest win to date in 2011 when Major Bombay, an Art Major colt, won the \$317,800 Woodrow Wilson final in 1:51.3 at The Meadowlands. While not quite the home run horse, Alagna says that Major Bombay did help him get noticed more.

"He's a horse that I selected as a yearling and had him basically from cradle to crown," Alagna says. "He won the Woodrow Wilson; he was second in his Metro elimination and had the unfortunate draw of the ten hole in the final of Metro and didn't do any good.

"I think he's a horse that probably gave me a little bit more recognition this year than anything else. I took him to Lexington and he'd had some hard starts and he just didn't feel like he was ready to go on.

"We'd raced him enough that I was comfortable putting him away and giving him the time while the weather was still good and gearing him up for his three-year-old campaign."

While Major Bombay won the Wilson final, his stablemate Mel Mara, a son of Lis Mara, came in fourth. Mel Mara opened eyes when he sprinted a last quarter of 25 seconds in his final

qualifier at the Meadowlands on July 16 at and then won his first start at the New Jersey racetrack on July 23 in 1:52 (:26.3 last quarter) despite being interfered with on the last turn. Although he didn't take the next step to being an elite two-year-old, Alagna says that there was a reason for that.

"Mel Mara is probably one of the fastest horses I've ever sat behind," Alagna said. "He's just got such an extreme turn of foot. He's got so many characteristics of Lis Mara who was a horse that it was like stepping on the accelerator in a sports car. You never felt a change of speed because he did it so smoothly and Mel Mara was the same way.

"The day that Yannick (driver Yannick Gingras) went a quarter in 25 seconds, he came back and said 'I had no idea I was going that fast.' He's that kind of horse. We raced him back after that, a horse made a break in the turn and Yannick had to jerk him sideways hard to avoid it. He still came back and won, but I don't think he was ever quite as good as

he was after that start.

"We gave him a week off and then we raced him in the Wilson prep, and he was second. We worked on him with the therapeutic laser because he showed some soreness in his back ankles, and he was better in the Woodrow Wilson.

'He ran in coming off the turn but more because of greenness than anything else. He was fourth and we decided to take him to Canada. He just wasn't himself when we took him up there for the Metro eliminations.

"After that start we sent him down to Brittany Farms because they are partners on the horse. We had a complete nuclear scan and check-up done and he just showed normal two-year-old changes in his back ankles. A lot of two-year-olds go through a normal remodeling process and he happened to be going through it, which was causing him to not be 100 per cent behind.

"He's a horse that gets so much speed off his drive behind that when he had to go into that next gear his ankles were hurting and he just couldn't do it.

We shut him down after that start. We just had it re-checked two weeks ago, and everything looks tremendous so he'll be coming in the middle of December.

"We have high expectations for the horse. Myron Bell and I were talking about him one day and the thing we kept saying is horses don't forget to go quarters in 25 seconds. The speed is there, the talent is there, we just have to manage him properly coming back as a three-year-old."

Alagna, who will also have the likes of pacing filly Rockaround Sue, a two-year-old Grand Circuit Stakes winner at The Red Mile and Pennsylvania Sires Stakes champion three-year-old trotting filly Caitrin Hall coming back next year, reloaded at this year's yearling sales and was especially happy with how he came out of the Lexington Selected Yearling Sale.

"We did very well at both sales. I always end up with the majority of my horses out of the Lexington sale, it just seems to work out that way," noted Alagna. "I have a lot of confidence

where I buy from and the people I buy from that sell at Lexington.

"The majority of horses that I buy are from Hunterton Farms and Brittany Farms. I always seem to do a lot of purchasing there because I believe in what they do. Amazingly enough when I went into Lexington, I spent a lot of time at the farms and on the pedigrees and everything and I had eight pacing colts on my list that I wanted to buy and we ended up buying all eight. That's a great

feat, I thought. We bought 18 horses at Lexington and nine at Harrisburg."

Those horses help to keep Alagna's vision of where he wants his career to go on the right track, and it's something he says that he's been striving for his entire life, although he has the awareness that the industry in both his native Illinois and his adopted New Jersey need help to continue to exist.

"I'm (at Gaitway Farms) every day, Sundays included. I come in on Sundays

to check on the barn. It's something I worked hard for and it's something that I've always wanted to do. I'm looking out after my own career. If I can't be here every day, then what? I go home for Christmas of course, but other than that I'm based here year-round.

"I wish Illinois had somebody that could take ahold and try to get something done. It's such a shame for either state to be going through what they're going through right now.

"The people in Illinois, the Horsemen's Association at home, they're working hard and so diligent trying to get something done but they're just fighting a losing battle all the time.

"Fortunately we have somebody like Jeff Gural who's stepped up and he's taking the initiative with some great people behind him trying to get things going the right direction. I hope that both states can get something going. There's such a misconception; nobody's looking for a hand-out, we just want to be able to be competitive with the surrounding states. Neither state has the ability to be competitive right now."

Alagna is also involved in the harness racing industry in Ontario, both with a string of eight horses that he has at Classy Lane Training Centre and with owner Aaron Waxman as a key contributor to his operation.

"The person that runs my barn in Canada is Trevor Boyd," Alagna stated. "He does a great job. He's worked for Tim and Carl Pinske, he's been their second trainer for quite a few years.

"He always went to Florida in the wintertime with the Pinskes, but he has a daughter who's in school and he just doesn't want to have to take her out of school and to Florida and bring her back and forth. He asked me if I'd be willing to leave some horses up there this winter and it's working out well.

"Aaron and I have a great working relationship. I consider him my friend; there aren't any of my clients in the barn that I don't enjoy calling on the phone and talking to. Aaron's one of those guys, you don't find many people that enjoy the business as much as he does. When the sale catalogue comes out, he's excited.

THE HUNTER

Sale results are needed but for this Kentucky nursery it's all ones and 2011 was another stellar year for Hunterton Farm

When January 1 arrives for Cindy and Steve Stewart of Hunterton Farm it is not just another day. As commercial breeders and marketers, it marks the start of another year with a blank sheet of paper. While there is plenty to gloat over for the past 12 months that is all in the past. It is very much a case of realizing that the market is asking the question 'What are you doing for me today?'

And that translates into a constant that has been the cornerstone of the Hunterton philosophy: success on the racetrack.

"This sounds like a broken record but we've said getting great yearling prices is important for sure but it's what happens on the racetrack that really matters. Selling yearlings for big money means nothing if we develop a reputation for our horses not performing," says Steve.

"This is a game that is measured by performance. If those horses ring the bell in the big money races the rest will take care of itself."

It remains a simple concept yet one that continues to be difficult to attain for many breeders. Hunterton Farm and Sales Agency walks the walk though and 2011 was a great example.

Simply Business, the \$350,000 headliner at the 2010 Lexington Selected Yearling Sale won the sport's richest race for juvenile pacers, the \$1 million Metro Pace at Mohawk Racetrack. That Rocknroll Hanover son tallied over \$682,000 in winnings and marked the third Hunterton graduate in the last four years to win the Metro Pace.

Then there was the sophomore filly Idyllic, trained by Casie Coleman, who followed up her title as Canadian Two Year Old Filly Pacer of the Year with

a gutsy showing to win the historic Jugette. She now boasts more than \$1.3 million in earnings.

Blue Porsche was also an O'Brien Award winner in Canada in 2010 and he returned to be in the forefront winning the \$347,000 Goodtimes for trainer Blair Burgess.

The big dog in the Ontario Sires Stakes two-year-old filly trot division was Miss Paris. This daughter of Kadabra - Pizza Dolce was at the finish line first when it mattered winning the \$300,000 OSS Super Final. A \$210,000 yearling she tallied \$486,000 this season.

And there were numerous others like Swinging Beauty p,3,1:52 (\$450,395), High Noon p,3,1:50.4 (\$404,401), Keenan 3,1:54f (\$297,054) and Romantic Moment p,2,1:51.2 (\$143,453) to name just a few.

Proven performance is what keeps the traffic at the Hunterton consignments in Lexington and Harrisburg busy. This year was no different as the company sold \$5 million in yearlings.

"Given the economic times people are telling us that the prices we got were extraordinary and maybe they were. But Cindy and I both believe there is never a better time to be racing and breeding horses," notes Steve.

"The purse money in so many jurisdictions has never been higher which leads to greater demand for quality yearlings. If you have the horse then you will be rewarded."

That was particularly evident on opening night at the Lexington Selected Sale in October when Frank Bellino of New York paid \$450,000 to halter Hitting The Cycle, a colt from the first crop of Somebeachsomewhere. That made him the highest priced pacing colt

of all time. That gave Hunterton Farm the accolade for having the sale topper at that auction for the fourth year in a row, a remarkable accomplishment.

But perhaps even more notable was a yearling that sold at the Harrisburg auction, hip #990. Here was a colt by Majestic Son that required a final bid of \$110,000 from trainer Mark Steacy to secure the ownership papers.

"He was catalogued very late in the sale but we'd been telling everyone that he was a very nice individual. His video looked good but truthfully we did not think he would command six figures. However, he was quite likely from the best mare that stallion bred but regardless it was very gratifying to sell a yearling for that amount of money so late in that sale."

So the question is now what?

There is good reason for optimism at the Paris, Kentucky nursery for the Stewarts and their partners. Just taking a stroll through the paddocks is reason enough to eliminate any discouraging thoughts of a difficult day.

Such a stroll would find a full brother to Simply Business, a full brother to Rock N Roll Heaven, a full sister to Adrian Chip, a half-sister to Miss Paris, a Muscle Hill first foal from Pure Ivory and Muscle Hill half-brother to Impressive Kemp. Quite a powerhouse indeed to start with.

"Cindy and I have plenty to be thankful for with our business. We are appreciative of our partners and customers but especially proud of the way these graduates perform. Like they say, build a better mousetrap and the world will

beat a path to your door," says Steve.

"Neither of us could imagine doing anything else. It's never easy but breeding, raising and selling horses provides a great deal of satisfaction. You could say it is the Hunterton way."
